How we can stop the spread

Practicing good hygiene is the best way we can stop the spread of Coronavirus.

FINANCIAL SUPPORT

Jobseeker: Payments from Centrelink for people who are unemployed and looking for work will be increased to \$1100 per fortnight for the next 6 months. The means test for getting Centrelink has also changed and the waiting times have been reduced.

JobKeeper: This is a payment of \$1500 for each employee so that businesses can continue to keep people employed. The \$1500 is the minimum payment and is not tax free.

Economic Support Payment: This is a \$750 once off payment for people who receive some Centrelink payments. This includes people on JobSeeker, the Age Pension or Disability Support Pension.

SHOULD I SEND MY CHILD TO SCHOOL?

Public schools in WA will be open for Term 2 for parents who choose to send their children.

The WA State Government has **given parents the choice** about whether their children return to school for face-to-face teaching or learn from home. It is a personal decision influenced by each family's circumstances.

The State Government will keep our schools safe and clean with school cleaners working throughout the day.

Parents may drop their children off at the school gate and are **not to enter the school** grounds.

Canteens will provide take-away only food, school swimming pools will be closed, and assemblies, camps, excursions and interschool activities will not be allowed.

FAQs

Should I wear a face mask? You do not need to wear a face mask if you're healthy. Face masks can help to prevent transmission of disease from infected patients to others.

Can I go to a beach or park? Yes, if you are exercising and practising social distancing by keeping 1.5m from other people. Groups are limited to two people.

Can I visit someone in hospital? Yes, WA public hospitals are limiting visit times to one hour in the morning and one hour in the evening.

Who can I speak to if I am concerned people are not complying to social distancing? You can contact the WA Police on 131 444.
